To Listen and to Share:

Listening. Step back and practice listening, notice your biases and judgements, notice when you are uncomfortable in order to build your emotional stamina. Validate others by listening closely and believing the truth and importance of what they are sharing. Acknowledge what you don't know. Ask questions.

To Notice:

It is easy to overlook what we're not looking for. Watch the video, **Test your Awareness: Do the Test**. Then go out in the world and change what you notice. Here is some of what you might look for:

- Who is and is not represented in ads?
- Who are your ten closest friends? What is the racial mix in the group?
- As you move through your day, what is the racial composition of the people around you?
- Notice how much of your day you are speaking about racism. Who are you engaging with on these issues?
- What are the last five books you have read? What is the racial mix of authors?
- Who is filling what kinds of jobs/social roles in your world? Can you correlate any of this to racial identity?
